For the Birds? Winter Bird Feeders

Birds are wild animals...should we feed them? Here's some food for thought from the Nova Scotia Bird Society and University of Alberta:

Although food can get scarce during the winter, and providing food can help birds survive the winter, sometimes bird feeders can cause unintentional harm.

WHAT IS THE HARM?

- Increases proximity of birds to each other relative to their behaviour while foraging for food in the wild, which can increase the likelihood of transmitting disease.
- The feeders themselves can be the cause of birds becoming sick, from mildewed and moldy seed.



TIPS FOR SAFE FEEDERS:

DURATION: Put out feeders after at least two hard frosts and remove when the ground thaws in spring.

REGULAR DISINFECTING:

At least once a month, each feeder needs to be thoroughly cleaned, disinfected, and allowed to dry completely before being set back outside with fresh seed (discard old seed).

LOCATION:

Select location to minimize strikes with windows (guidance can be found online).
