Jane Rostek, Horticultural Supervisor of the HRM Caledonia Greenhouse Depot at #62 Caledonia Road, will lead us on an enlightening tour of this very busy and productive facility. One of two main greenhouse depots within HRM, it mainly supplies the Dartmouth side of the harbour, while the Halifax depot does the same for the Halifax side. These depots are responsible for the propagation, supply, and planting of both annuals and perennials, with maybe a few tropical plants as well. Jane is a graduate of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College in Truro, and as a result her background in both the private sector and HRM promises to make this a memorable tour. **Registration is required – space will be limited**. **Also**, **please park at #50 Caledonia Road** (East Dartmouth Community Centre) instead of tying up the depot's limited parking.

### TREE IDENTIFICATION

Thursday, Feb. 13th

Peter Duinker, Professor Emeritus at Dalhousie's School for Resource and Environmental Studies, is going to lead us through the ins and outs of tree identification. After being around trees for about 65 years or so, he feels qualified to help other amateurs at tree identification. He'll cover the various species of both hardwoods and softwoods and how we can identify them by observing the different characteristics of each tree. He'll relate how we can use the following set of tools in this identification process, such as a good reference book, a hand lens, and a good Phone App. Then there are specific tree traits to look for, such as the tree's form, bark structure, buds, leaves, needles, flowers, and fruit. Peter will discuss the easier ID's and some not-so-easy ID's. (Perhaps when he's finished, I'll be able to reliably tell White Birch and Grey Birch apart in the winter – *Bernie McKenna*).

We have an opportunity to view HRM's new and technically advanced facility under the guidance of General manager Sean Hagan. It represents a huge leap forward from the previous two facilities both in design and operation. Open since September of 2024, it serves all of HRM and boasts many advances over the previous two plants, including the following; the whole process is carried out under one roof, with no outside processing, thus minimising outside impacts; high quality compost can be produced in 3 months; it has capacity of 60 tonnes, readily expandable to 75 tonnes; there are new energy efficiencies with lighting, heating, wastewater containment, and treatment; and odour control limits any unwanted effects to its neighbouring communities. There are many other Improvements as well. Designed to operate for 25 years, it will go far in addressing our organic waste situation well into this century. Registration is required for both communication purposes and potential numbers limitations.


#### NATURE ADVENTURES...
