LANDFILL RECLAMATION WALK SATURDAY, APR. 25

This late spring outing is a two-part event at a 1984 decommissioned West Hants landfill. The first part is a walking view of the landfill itself, which has been reclaimed and is now an excellent soccer field facility. The second is the 1.6 km Glooscap Trail loop. This trail follows a well-wooded course of gentle elevation changes on a well packed and wide earthen surface. It features a small water course and a few vernal ponds. Being late April, we may expect a few lingering snow patches and some wet spots. A previous walk proved the 'SEEK' and 'Merlin' apps were a definite benefit. **Appropriate footwear is recommended. Registration is required and a \$10:00 non-member fee will apply.**

SPRING BIRD TALK

TUESDAY, MAY 19

Long time HFN member and bird authority, Clarence Stevens will give a detailed talk on the colourful array of birds that visit our urban parks during the spring migration period. He will provide a wealth of information as to which of our urban parks to visit, and just as importantly when to visit certain parks in order to fully enjoy these spring migrants. This presentation will also provide specific information about the bird species that can be found in our city parks and our own backyards during the breeding season. It should be noted Clarence has a published book on the more prolific birding spots in the area.
